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# The Gathering

As the bell rings, we stand to sing (NEH 162):

#### Introit

As the altar—representing Christ—is greeted and honoured with incense the Choir sings the following introit:

In thy strength, O Lord, shall the righteous be joyful: exceeding glad shall he be of thy salvation: his heart's desire and longing hast thou bestowed upon him.

Grace, mercy and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ be with you and also with you.

The celebration is introduced and we are invited to remember and confess our sins in preparation for our celebration together. The choir sings the Kyries and the Gloria.

**Penitential Rite** 

Almighty God, our heavenly Father,

we have sinned against you, through our own fault, in thought and word and deed, and in what we have left undone. We are heartily sorry and repent of all our sins. For your Son our Lord Jesus Christ's sake, forgive us all that is past; and grant that we may serve you in newness of life to the glory of your name. Amen.

#### Gloria

Glory be to God on high and in earth peace, goodwill towards men. We praise thee we bless thee, we worship thee we glorify thee, we give thanks to thee for thy great glory, O Lord God, heavenly King, God the Father almighty. O Lord, the only-begotten Son, Jesus Christ: O Lord God, Lamb of God, Son of the Father, that takest away the sins of the world, have mercy upon us. Thou that takest away the sins of the world, receive our prayer. Thou that sittest at the right hand of God the Father, have mercy upon us. For thou only art holy; thou only art the Lord; thou only, O Christ, with the Holy Ghost, art the Most High in the glory of God the Father. Amen.

#### Collect

God of hosts, who so kindled the flame of love in the heart of your servant George that he bore witness to the risen Lord by his life and by his death: give us the same faith and power of love that we who rejoice in his triumphs may come to share with him the fullness of the resurrection; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. **Amen** 

### First Reading: 2 Timothy 2.3-13

The celebrant invites the people to Communion

Invitation to Communion

Behold is the Lamb of God, who takes away the sins of the world. Blessed are those who are called to his supper. Lord, I am not worthy to receive you, but only say the word, and my soul shall be healed.

The chalice is restored to all who wish to communicate in both kinds. **Please do not intinct—this** is the least hygienic method of receiving Holy Communion. All who are baptised and communicant members of one of the Christian churches are welcome to receive communion with us. During Communion the Choir sings the Benedictus from the Little Organ Mass:

Blessed is he that cometh in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

Those who are prevented from doing so by their conscience, or the discipline of their Church, are most welcome to come to the altar for a blessing at the time of communion. You may like to use the following prayer:

My Jesus, I believe that you are present in the Blessed Sacrament, I love you above all things and I desire you in my soul. Since I cannot receive you now sacramentally, come at least spiritually into my soul. As though you were already there I embrace you and unite myself wholly to you; permit not that I should ever be separated from you. Amen.

#### **Post Communion Sentence**

Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God.

The Lord be with you and also with you. May God the... Amen. Go in the peace of Christ. Thanks be to God.

#### Post Communion Prayer

God our redeemer, whose Church was strengthened by the blood of your martyr George: so bind us, in life and death, to Christ's sacrifice that our lives, broken and offered with his, may carry his death and proclaim his resurrection in the world; through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.** 

Please be seated for the notices, after which we sing the hymn on the opposite page (NEH 120). After the Blessing and Dismissal the clergy and servers leave during the organ voluntary. You are invited to remain in your seats for this final act of worship.

Dismissal

Remember Jesus Christ, raised from the dead, a descendant of David—that is my gospel, for which I suffer hardship, even to the point of being chained like a criminal. But the word of God is not chained. Therefore I endure everything for the sake of the elect, so that they may also obtain the salvation that is in Christ Jesus, with eternal glory. The saying is sure: If we have died with him, we will also live with him; if we endure, we will also reign with him; if we deny him, he will also deny us; if we are faithless, he remains faithful—for he cannot deny himself.

We remain seated as the choir sings the psalm appointed for today (Psalm 126).

When the Lord turned again the captivity of Sion \* then were we like unto them that dream. Then was our mouth filled with laughter \* and our tongue with joy. Then said they among the heathen \* The Lord hath done great things for them. Yea, the Lord hath done great things for us already \* whereof we rejoice. Turn our captivity, O Lord \* as the rivers in the south. They that sow in tears \* shall reap in joy. He that now goeth on his way weeping, and beareth forth good seed \* shall doubtless come again with joy, and bring his sheaves with him.

Please stand for the gradual hymn (NEH 490):

Judge eternal, throned in splendour, Lord of lords and King of kings, With thy living fire of judgement Purge this realm of bitter things; Solace all its wide dominion With the healing of thy wings.

Ill the weary folk are pining For the hour that brings release; And the city's crowded clangour Cries aloud for sin to cease; And the homesteads and the woodlands Plead in silence for their peace.

Crown, O God, thine own endeavour, Cleave our darkness with your sword, Feed the faithless and the hungry With the richness of thy word; Cleanse the body of this nation Through the glory of the Lord.

# The Liturgy of the Sacrament

#### Peace

Once we were far off, but now in union with Christ Jesus we have been brought near through the shedding of Christ's blood, for he is our peace.

The peace of the risen Christ be always with you **and also with you.** 

We are invited to give one another a sign of peace. We may now shake hands but please be aware your neighbour might not want to do so! The hymn at the Preparation of the Table (NEH 432).

O what their joy and their glory must be, Those endless Sabbaths the blessèd ones see; Crown for the valiant, to weary ones, rest; God shall be all, and in all ever blessed.

What are the Monarch, his court, and his throne? What are the peace and the joy that they own? Tell us, ye blest ones, that in it have share, If what ye feel ye can fully declare!

Truly Jerusalem name we that shore, 'Vision of peace,' that brings joy evermore! Wish and fulfilment can severed be ne'er, Nor the thing prayed for come short of the prayer. We, where no trouble distraction can bring, Safely the anthems of Sion shall sing; While for thy grace, Lord, their voices of praise Thy blessed people shall evermore raise.

There dawns no sabbath, no sabbath is o'er, Those sabbath-keepers, have one and no more; One and unending is that triumph-song Which to the angels and us shall belong.

Now, in the meanwhile, with hearts raised on high, We for that country must yearn and must sigh; Seeking Jerusalem, dear native land, Through our long exile on Babylon's strand.
