
Notices

St George's Paris

Easter Vigil: 8th April 2023

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A warm welcome to St George's. Tonight the choir will sing the **Mass in G** by Franz Schubert (1797-1828)

The Paschal Vigil is the celebration of the whole mystery of redemption. It belongs to Passiontide and to Eastertide, and the change from one to the other is worked out during the course of the service. It falls into four main parts:

The Service of Light. This consists of the Blessing of the New Fire, the Blessing and Lighting of the Paschal Candle, the Entry into the church and the Paschal Proclamation [or Exultet]. The theme of light links both the Creation and the Resurrection and looks forward to the Second Coming - "Blessed are those servants whom the Master finds awake when he comes." [Luke 12: 37]

The Vigil of Readings. In the light of the Risen Christ, we listen again to the story of the Creation, the liberation of God's people from slavery and the promise of further redemption. The Gloria returns, and the jubilant fanfare which heralds this, as well as the Alleluia following St Paul's teaching on baptism, prepare us for the Gospel of the Resurrection, with which this section concludes.

The Liturgy of Initiation. The triumph of Christ becomes the triumph of the individual Christian in Baptism, when we become members of his Body, the Church. On this night the Church welcomes new members in baptism and, in so doing, we renew our own baptismal commitment to Christ.

The First Eucharist of Easter. The early Church expected that the Second Coming of Christ would occur during the night of Easter - "Behold the Bridegroom: come out to meet him [Matt 25:6] and when this ceased to be a literal expectation the Easter liturgy provided the means by which, in the sacramental forms of bread and wine, Christians encounter their Risen Lord as they await his final coming in glory.

We gather today in the Parish Hall where a new fire is kindled safely in the street. Here we ask God to bless the Light.

Procession of Light

The congregation acclaims the new light brought into the darkness of death three times.

The Light is shared and after placing the Paschal Candle in its candlestick the minister sings the ancient Easter Proclamation or **Exsultet.**

Vigil of the Resurrection

The priest introduces the Vigil and keep your candle lit, if you wish to follow the psalms (NEH 518).

The Liturgy of the Eucharist

Collect

O God of glory, by the raising of your Son you have broken the chains of death and hell: fill your Church with faith and hope; for a new day has dawned and the way to life stands open in our Saviour Jesus Christ. **Amen.**

Epistle: Romans 6:3-11

Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? Therefore we have been buried with him by baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, so we too might walk in newness of life. For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we will certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his. We know that our old self was crucified with him so that the body of sin might be destroyed, and we might no longer be enslaved to sin. For whoever has died is freed from sin. But if we have died with Christ, we believe that we will also live with him. We know that Christ, being raised from the dead, will never die again; death no longer has dominion over him. The death he died, he died to sin, once for all; but the life he lives, he lives to God. So you also must consider yourselves dead to sin and alive to God in Christ lesus.

The minister and choir sing the Alleluias and psalm 150 to greet the Gospel.

O give thanks unto the Lord, for he is gracious * and his mercy endures for ever. O praise the Lord all ye heathen * praise him all ye nations. For his merciful kindness towards us is ever more and more * and the truth of the Lord endureth for ever.



Since I cannot receive you now sacramentally, come at least spiritually into my soul. As though you were already there I embrace you and unite myself wholly to you; permit not that I should ever be separated from you. Amen.

Post Communion Prayer

God of life, who for our redemption gave your only-begotten Son to the death of the cross, and by his glorious resurrection have delivered us from the power of our enemy: grant us so to die daily to sin, that we may evermore live with him in the joy of his risen life; through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

Sermon

Please be seated—after the sermon we sing the following hymn (NEH 317) during which our candles are re-lit. After the Blessing of the Font with the Paschal Candle we renew our Baptismal Promises.

With Christ we share a mystic grave, With Christ we buried lie; But not within the darksome cave By mournful Calvary.

The pure and bright baptismal flood Entombs our nature's stain: New creatures from the cleansing wave With Christ we rise again.

Thrice blest, if through this world of sin, And lust and selfish care, Our resurrection robe of white And undefiled we wear.

Thrice blest, if through the gates of death, Glorious at last and free, We to our joyful rising pass, O risen Lord with thee.

And now to thy thrice holy Name, The God whom we adore, To Father, Son, and Spirit blest, Be glory evermore. Amen.

Renewal of Baptism Vows

Dear friends, through the paschal mystery we have been buried with Christ in baptism, so that we may rise with him to new life. Now that we have completed our Lenten observance, let us renew the promises we made in baptism when we rejected Satan and his works, and promised to serve God faithfully in his holy catholic Church.

Therefore I ask these questions:

Do you turn to Christ! I turn to Christ / Oui, je m'y tourne.

Do you repent of your sins? I repent of my sins / Oui, je m'en repens Do you renounce evil? I renounce evil / Oui, j'y renonce

And now I ask you to make the profession of Christian faith into which you were baptised, and in which you live and grow.

Do you believe and trust in God the Father, who made the world? I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.

Do you believe and trust in his Son Jesus Christ, who redeemed all people? I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord. He was conceived by the power of the Holy Spirit and born of the Virgin Mary. He suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried. He descended to the dead. On the third day he rose again. He ascended into heaven,

and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again to judge the living and the dead.

Do you believe and trust in his Holy Spirit, who gives life to the people of God? I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and life everlasting. Amen.

The priest sprinkles the people with water from the font and the choir sings **Vidi aquam.**

'I saw water coming forth from the temple on the right side, alleluia: and all those to whom this water came were saved, and shall say, alleluia, alleluia. Give praise to the Lord, for He is good: For His mercy endureth forever.'

The Liturgy of the Sacrament

Peace

The risen Christ came and stood among his disciples and said, 'Peace be with you.' Then were they glad when they saw the Lord, Alleluia!

The peace of the risen Christ be always with you and also with you.

We are invited to give one another a sign of peace. The hymn at the Preparation of the Table follows (NEH 296):

Lord, enthroned in heavenly splendour, First begotten from the dead, Thou alone, our strong defender, Liftest up thy people's head. Alleluya, Jesus, true and living bread!

Here our humblest homage pay we: Here in loving reverence bow; Here for Faith's discernment, pray we Lest we fail to know thee now. Alleluya, Thou art here, we ask not how.

Though the lowliest form doth veil Thee,

As of old in Bethlehem, Here as there Thine Angels hail Thee, Branch and flower of Jesse's stem. Alleluya, We in worship join with them.

Paschal Lamb, Thy offering, finished Once for all when Thou wast slain, In its fullness undiminished Shall for evermore remain. Alleluya, Cleansing souls from every stain.

Life imparting Heavenly manna, Stricken rock with streaming side, Heaven and earth with loud hosanna Worship Thee, the Lamb who died, Alleluya, Risen, ascended, glorified!

Eucharistic Prayer



It is right to give thanks and praise.

The celebrant praises God for his mighty acts in the Preface and the Choir sings the Sanctus and Benedictus.

Holy, holy, holy Lord God of hosts, heaven and earth are full of thy glory. Glory be to Thee, O Lord most high. Blessed is he that cometh in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

The prayer continues until the Proclamation of Faith
