Palm Sunday: 24th March 2024

A warm welcome to St George's worship this week—online or in person Everything you need for today's service you'll find in this pamphlet.. Today the setting is the **Missa O quam gloriosum** by Tomas Luis de Victoria (1548-1611), the anthem during Communion is **Pueri Hebraeorum** by Tomas Luis de Victoria (1548-1611) and the Sortie will be **Ruht wohl, ihr heiligen Gebeine** (from St John's Passion) by Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750).

Our preacher this year is the Very Rev'd Andrew Nunn, until recently Dean of Southwark. He writes:

I am so looking forward to being part of Holy Week at St George's Paris in 2024. This will be my first Holy Week after retirement and so it will be exciting to be sharing it with a different congregation. Until July 2023 I was Dean of Southwark and had been at the cathedral since 1999. But whilst there, as in the other places in which I have ministered, Holy Week has been a most important and wonderful experience. For me, much of that comes from being trained alongside the Community of the Resurrection at Mirfield. We will be pilgrims together, companions on the road with Jesus as we stand by both the cross and the empty tomb.

A Retreat in Daily Life enables you to enter into the Mystery of our Saviour's Passion, Death and Resurrection. Each day your church has morning and evening services using music, poetry, liturgy and preaching to explore how Jesus sets us free from sin. You can make your confession at any time.

Confessions at 1745h Monday—Thursday or by appointment.

The full calendar for Holy Week will be found on the back of this service sheet. The Daily Offices of Mattins and Evensong will be celebrated daily during Holy Week at 0915 and 1830.

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On this day the Church celebrates Christ's entrance into Jerusalem to accomplish his paschal mystery. So today we gather in the street/hall for our entry into church. When all is ready the choir sings the antiphon 'Hosanna to the Son of David' (NEH 508).

+ In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

Amen

Grace, mercy and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ be with you. **And also with you.**

The priest introduces the celebration & blesses the palms. The palm gospel is proclaimed. The procession is announced and we sing the hymn (NEH 509):

Let us go forth in peace.

In the name of Christ. Amen.

All glory, laud, and honour To thee, Redeemer, King, To whom the lips of children Made sweet hosannas ring.

Thou art the king of Israel, Thou David's royal son, Who in the Lord's name comest, The King and blessèd one. All glory...

The company of angels Are praising thee on high, And mortal men and all things Created make reply. All glory...

The people of the Hebrews With palms before thee went: Our praise and prayer and anthems Before thee we present. All glory...

To thee before thy passion They sang their hymns of praise: To thee, now high exalted, Our melody we raise. All glory...

Thou didst accept their praises, Accept the prayers we bring, Who in all good delightest, Thou good and gracious King. All glory...

At the altar step we sing The Prophetic Anthem (NEH 510) and the service continues with the hymn (NEH 511):

Ride on, ride on in majesty! Hark! all the tribes hosanna cry; Thy humble beast pursues his road With palms and scattered garments strowed

Ride on, ride on in majesty! In lowly pomp ride on to die; O Christ, thy triumphs now begin O'er captive death and conquered sin.

Ride on, ride on in majesty! The winged squadrons of the sky Look down with sad and wondering eyes To see the approaching sacrifice.

Ride on, ride on in majesty! Thy last and fiercest strife is nigh; The Father on His sapphire throne Awaits his own anointed Son.

Ride on, ride on in majesty! In lowly pomp ride on to die; Bow thy meek head to mortal pain, Then take, O God, thy power, and reign.

Therefore God also highly exalted him and gave him the name that is above every name, so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bend, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.
