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St George's Paris Trinity 6 (Proper 12): 27th July 2025

A warm welcome to St George's worship this week—online or in person. Everything you need for today's service you'll find in this pamphlet.

During the summer our choir takes a well earned break and today the congregational setting of the Eucharist is by John Merbecke. Born in Beverley, Yorkshire he was subsequently a choirboy at St George's, Windsor where he became organist from 1541. Condemned for heresy, and sentenced to be burnt, he was saved by Stephen Gardiner, Bishop of Winchester, who said he was "but a musitian". His 1550 setting of the new English service became obsolete with the new Prayer Book of 1552 but was revived in the 19th century. You can find the setting at the back of the green hymnbooks (NEH 542).

If you are watching online or don't wish to receive Holy Communion you may like to use this prayer:

My Jesus, I believe that you are present in the Blessed Sacrament, I love you above all things and I desire you in my soul.

Since I cannot receive you now sacramentally, come at least spiritually into my soul. As though you were already there I embrace you and unite myself wholly to you; permit not that I should ever be separated from you. Amen.

Post Communion Prayer

God of our pilgrimage, you have led us to the living water: refresh and sustain us as we go forward on our journey, in the name of Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen**.

Please be seated for the notices after which we sing the final hymn (NEH 335).

All praise to thee, for thou. O King divine, Didst yield the glory that of right was thine, That in our darkened hearts thy grace might shine: Alleluya.

The Liturgy of the Word

First Reading: Genesis 18.20-32

Then the Lord said, 'How great is the outcry against Sodom and Gomorrah and how very grave their sin! I must go down and see whether they have done altogether according to the outcry that has come to me; and if not, I will know.' So the men turned from there, and went towards Sodom, while Abraham remained standing before the Lord. Then Abraham came near and said, 'Will you indeed sweep away the righteous with the wicked? Suppose there are fifty righteous within the city; will you then sweep away the place and not forgive it for the fifty righteous who are in it? Far be it from you to do such a thing, to slay the righteous with the wicked, so that the righteous fare as the wicked! Far be that from you! Shall not the Judge of all the earth do what is just?' And the Lord said, 'If I find at Sodom fifty righteous in the city, I will forgive the whole place for their sake.' Abraham answered, 'Let me take it upon myself to speak to the Lord, I who am but dust and ashes. Suppose five of the fifty righteous are lacking? Will you destroy the whole city for lack of five?' And he said, 'I will not destroy it if I find forty-five there.' Again he spoke to him, 'Suppose forty are found there.' He answered, 'For the sake of forty I will not do it.' Then he said, 'Oh do not let the Lord be angry if I speak. Suppose thirty are found there.' He answered, 'I will not do it, if I find thirty there.' He said, 'Let me take it upon myself to speak to the Lord. Suppose twenty are found there.' He answered, 'For the sake of twenty I will not destroy it.' Then he said, 'Oh do not let the Lord be angry if I speak just once more. Suppose ten are found there.' He answered, 'For the sake of ten I will not destroy it.

We remain seated to sing the hymn replacing the psalm of the day (NEH 236).

Lord, as I wake I turn to you, Yourself the first thought of my day: My King, my God, whose help is sure, Yourself the help for which I pray.

There is no blessing, Lord, from you For those who make their will their way, No praise for those who will not praise, No peace for those who will not pray.

Your loving gifts of grace to me, Those favours I could never earn, Call for my thanks in praise and prayer, Call me to love you in return.

Lord, make my life a life of love, Keep me from sin in all I do; Lord, make your law my only law, Your will my will, for love of you.

Second Reading: Colossians 2.6-15

As you therefore have received Christ Jesus the Lord, continue to live your lives in him, rooted and built up in him and established in the faith, just as you were taught, abounding in thanksgiving. See to it that no one takes you captive through philosophy and empty deceit, according to human tradition, according to the elemental spirits of the universe, and not according to Christ. For in him the whole fullness of deity dwells bodily, and you have come to fullness in him, who is the head of every ruler and authority. In him also you were circumcised with a spiritual circumcision, by putting off the body of the flesh in the circumcision of Christ; when you were buried with him in baptism, you were also raised with him through faith in the power of God, who raised him from the dead. And when you were dead in trespasses and the uncircumcision of your flesh, God made you alive

together with him, when he forgave us all our trespasses, erasing the record that stood against us with its legal demands. He set this aside, nailing it to the cross. He disarmed the rulers and authorities and made a public example of them, triumphing over them in it.

Holy Gospel: Luke 11.1-4

Jesus was praying in a certain place, and after he had finished, one of his disciples said to him, 'Lord, teach us to pray, as John taught his disciples.' He said to them, 'When you pray, say: Father, hallowed be your name. Your kingdom come. Give us each day our daily bread. Forgive us our sins, for we ourselves forgive everyone indebted to us. And do not bring us to the time of trial.'


