Welcome to the Eucharist today. We are delighted to meet visitors and newcomers after the service, when drinks will be served in the Parish Hall. Our Summer Programme continues with a Saturday Eucharist at 1200h and the Eucharist on Sunday at 0830 and 1030h.

Our preacher next week at 10h30 will be Fr George Guiver CR.

The Assumption will be celebrated with splendour this year in Notre Dame. On the **Vigil, Thursday 14th there** will be a Mass at 1800 followed by a procession inside the Cathedral and exposition of the Crown of Thorns at 19h15. At 20h15 there will be the Proclamation of the Gospel and preaching, followed by the vow of Louis XIII and at 21h00 Compline.

On Friday, August 15, 2025 at 15h45 there will be an outdoor procession which will start from the Parvis: with the statue of the Virgin and Child of Charles X, presided over by Mgr Emmanuel Tois, Auxiliary Bishop of Paris. It will return at 17h15 for Vespers and then a Solemn Mass at 18h00.

St George's Retreat will this year be from 17th – 19th October 2025 and will be led by the Very Rev'd Richard Peers, formerly Dean of Llandaff. He will be looking at Shakespeare and the Spiritual Life at L'Abbaye de Notre Dame de Jouarre, 77640 Jouarre. This is a lovely Benedictine Abbey founded for women religious in the seventh century by the Irish monk-evangelist St Columbanus. It is 70 km east of Paris, easily reachable by RER and bus (but there is parking too). We will share worship with the nuns. There is accommodation in the Abbey for twenty people in single rooms, most with ensuite facilities. The cost will be around 140 euros. 

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St George's Paris



A warm welcome to St George's worship this week—online or in person. Everything you need for today's service you'll find in this pamphlet.

During the summer our choir takes a well earned break and today the congregational setting of the Eucharist is by John Merbecke. Born in Beverley, Yorkshire he was subsequently a choirboy at St George's, Windsor where he became organist from 1541. Condemned for heresy, and sentenced to be burnt, he was saved by Stephen Gardiner, Bishop of Winchester, who said he was "but a musitian". His 1550 setting of the new English service became obsolete with the new Prayer Book of 1552 but was revived in the 19th century. You can find the setting at the back of the green hymnbooks (NEH 542).

During the summer programme the Eucharist is celebrated at midday on Saturday and at 0830 and 1030 on Sundays.

Penitential Rite



Invitation to Communion

All are welcome to receive Holy Communion if you do so in your own church. If you would prefer, please come forward and bow your head for a blessing. **Please do not intinct—it is forbidden by our bishops and dangerous for coeliacs.** Please follow the directions of the Sides-people. If you are watching online or don't wish to receive Holy Communion you may like to use this prayer:

My Jesus, I believe that you are present in the Blessed Sacrament, I love you above all things and I desire you in my soul.

Since I cannot receive you now sacramentally, come at least spiritually into my soul. As though you were already there I embrace you and unite myself wholly to you; permit not that I should ever be separated from you. Amen.

Post Communion Prayer

Strengthen for service, Lord, the hands that have taken holy things; may the ears which have heard your word be deaf to clamour and dispute; may the tongues which have sung your praise be free from deceit; may the eyes which have seen the tokens of your love shine with the light of hope; and may the bodies which have been fed with your body be refreshed with the fullness of your life; glory to you for ever. **Amen**.

Please be seated for the notices after which we sing the final hymn (NEH 453).

The Liturgy of the Word

First Reading: Genesis 15:1-6

After these things the word of the Lord came to Abram in a vision, "Do not be afraid, Abram, I am your shield; your reward shall be very great." But Abram said, "O Lord God, what will you give me, for I continue childless, and the heir of my house is Eliezer of Damascus?" And Abram said, "You have given me no offspring, and so a slave born in my house is to be my heir." But the word of the Lord came to him, "This man shall not be your heir; no one but your very own issue shall be your heir." He brought him outside and said, "Look toward heaven and count the stars, if you are able to count them." Then he said to him, "So shall your descendants be." And he believed the Lord; and the Lord reckoned it to him as righteousness.

We remain seated to sing the hymn replacing the psalm of the day (NEH 428):

O Son of God, eternal Love, Who came in mercy from above To bring to men the Father's grace, And sanctify a ransomed race.

Illumine every Christian mind, And grant us through your Word to find The truth that sets the bondsman free, The service that is liberty.

To Christ whose blood for us was shed, Who rose victorious from the dead, Whose glory all the saints adore, Be endless praise for evermore.

Second Reading: Hebrews 11:1-3, 8-16

Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen. Indeed, by faith our ancestors received approval. By faith we understand that the worlds were prepared by the word of God, so that what is seen was made from things that are not visible. By faith Abraham obeyed when he was called to set out for a place that he was to receive as an inheritance; and he set out, not knowing where he was going. By faith he stayed for a time in the land he had been promised, as in a foreign land, living in tents, as did Isaac and Jacob, who were heirs with him of the same promise. For he looked forward to the city that has foundations, whose architect and builder is God. By faith he received power of procreation, even though he was too old—and Sarah herself was barren—because he considered him faithful who had promised. Therefore from one person, and this one as good as dead, descendants were born, "as many as the stars of heaven and as the innumerable grains of sand by the seashore." All of these died in faith without having received the promises, but from a distance they saw and greeted them. They confessed that they were strangers and foreigners on the earth, for people who speak in this way make it clear that they are seeking a homeland. If they had been thinking

of the land that they had left behind, they would have had opportunity to return. But as it is, they desire a better country, that is, a heavenly one. Therefore God is not ashamed to be called their God; indeed, he has prepared a city for them.

Please stand for the gradual hymn (NEH 463):

Thine for ever! God of love, Hear us from thy throne above; Thine for ever may we be Here and in eternity.

Thine for ever! O, how blest They who find in thee thier rest! Saviour, Guardian, heavenly Friend, O defend us to the end.

Thine for ever! Lord of life, Shield us through our earthly strife; Thou the Life, the Truth, the Way, Guide us to the realms of day.

Thine for ever! Thou our guide, All our wants by thee supplied, All our sins by thee forgiven, Led by thee from earth to heaven.

Holy Gospel: Luke 12:32-40

"Do not be afraid, little flock, for it is your Father's good pleasure to give you the kingdom. Sell your possessions, and give alms. Make purses for yourselves that do not wear out, an unfailing treasure in heaven, where no thief comes near and no moth destroys. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also. "Be dressed for action and have your lamps lit; be like those who are waiting for their master to return from the wedding banquet, so that they may open the door for him as soon as he comes and knocks. Blessed are those slaves whom the master finds alert when he comes; truly I tell you, he will fasten his belt and have them sit down to eat, and he will come and serve them. If he comes during the middle of the night, or near dawn, and finds them so, blessed are those slaves. "But know this: if the owner of the house had known at what hour the thief was coming, he would not have let his house be broken into. You also must be ready, for the Son of Man is coming at an unexpected hour."

Eucharistic Prayer




The celebrant praises God for his mighty acts in the Preface and we sings the Sanctus and Benedictus.
