In hope at last of heaven, To hear the Lord's 'Well done!'**

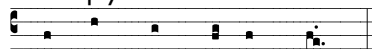

The Lord be with you



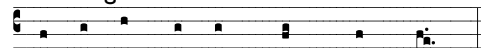

The celebrant praises God for his mighty acts in the Preface and the Choir sings the Sanctus.

Holy, holy, holy Lord God of hosts, heaven and earth are full of thy glory.

Glory be to Thee, O Lord most high.

Blessed is he that cometh in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

During the Eucharistic Prayer we proclaim the mystery of faith by using the following:

Praise to you, Lord Jesus:

Dying you destroyed our death,

rising you restored our life:

Lord Jesus, come in glory.

At the end of the prayer we all respond

... in songs of everlasting praise:

Blessing and honour and glory and power

be yours for ever and ever. Amen.

We remain standing to pray together

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name; thy kingdom come; thy will be done; on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation; but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, the power and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

The Liturgy of the Word

Sunday School leave for their activities as we listen to the Scriptures.

First Reading: Acts 9:1-22

Meanwhile Saul, still breathing threats and murder against the disciples of the Lord, went to the high priest and asked him for letters to the synagogues at Damascus, so that if he found any who belonged to the Way, men or women, he might bring them bound to Jerusalem. Now as he was going along and approaching Damascus, suddenly a light from heaven flashed around him. He fell to the ground and heard a voice saying to him, 'Saul, Saul, why do you persecute me?' He asked, 'Who are you, Lord?' The reply came, 'I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting. But get up and enter the city, and you will be told what you are to do.' The men who were travelling with him stood speechless because they heard the voice but saw no one. Saul got up from the ground, and though his eyes were open, he could see nothing; so they led him by the hand and brought him into Damascus. For three days he was without sight, and neither ate nor drank. Now there was a disciple in Damascus named Ananias. The Lord said to him in a vision, 'Ananias.' He answered, 'Here I am, Lord.' The Lord said to him, 'Get up and go to the street called Straight, and at the house of Judas look for a man of Tarsus named Saul. At this moment he is praying, and he has seen in a vision a man named Ananias come in and lay his hands on him so that he might regain his sight.' But Ananias answered, 'Lord, I have heard from many about this man, how much evil he has done to your saints in Jerusalem; and here he has authority from the chief priests to bind all who invoke your name.' But the Lord said to him, 'Go, for he is an instrument whom I have chosen to bring my name before Gentiles and kings and before the people of Israel; I myself will show him how much he must suffer for the sake of my name.' So Ananias went and entered the house. He laid his hands on Saul and said, 'Brother Saul, the Lord Jesus, who appeared to you on your way here, has sent me so that you may regain your sight and be filled with the Holy Spirit.' And immediately something like scales fell from his eyes, and his sight was restored. Then he got up and was baptized, and after taking some food, he regained his strength. For several days he was with the disciples in Damascus, and immediately he began to proclaim Jesus in the synagogues, saying, 'He is the Son of God.' All who heard him were amazed and said, 'Is not this the man who made havoc in Jerusalem among those who invoked this name? And has he not come here for the purpose of bringing them bound before the chief priests?' Saul became increasingly more powerful and confounded the Jews who lived in Damascus by proving that Jesus was the Messiah.

Please remain seated whilst the choir sings the psalm appointed for the day (Psalm 67)

*God be merciful unto us, and bless us * and shew us the light of his countenance, and be merciful unto us; That thy way may be known upon earth * thy saving health among all nations.*

*Let the people praise thee, O God * yea, let all the people praise thee. O let the nations rejoice and be glad * for thou shalt judge the folk righteously, and govern the nations upon earth. Let the people praise thee, O God * let all the people praise thee. Then shall the earth bring forth her increase * and God, even our own God, shall give us his blessing. God shall bless us * and all the ends of the world shall fear him.*

Second Reading: Galatians 1:11-16a

For I want you to know, brothers and sisters, that the gospel that was proclaimed by me is not of human origin, for I did not receive it from a human source, nor was I taught it, but I received it through a revelation of Jesus Christ. You have heard, no doubt, of my earlier life in Judaism. I was violently persecuting the church of God and was trying to destroy it. I advanced in Judaism beyond many among my people of the same age, for I was far more zealous for the traditions of my ancestors. But when the one who had set me apart before I was born and called me through his grace was pleased to reveal his Son to me, so that I might proclaim him among the gentiles.

Please stand for the gradual hymn (REH 204).

**A heavenly splendour from on high, A light too great for mortal eye,
Deprives the hunter of his prey And turns his threatening wrath away.**

**In darkened eyes, an inward light Begins to shine upon his sight,
As in his heart he hears the call To follow, and surrender all.**

**The Christ, for sinners crucified, Whose risen power he had denied,
Now claims this servant for his own, And bids him make the gospel known.**

**The nations listen to his voice, And in the peace of Christ rejoice;
The Church on earth his praises sing, Who led the Gentiles to their King.**

**Blest Paul, the convert of the Lord, May heaven's light to us afford
A blindness to the lures of sin, That we with thee a crown may win**

**To God the Father, God the Son, And God the Spirit, Three in One,
From saints on earth and saints in heaven, Let everlasting praise be given.
Amen.**

Holy Gospel: Matthew 19.27-30

Then Peter said in reply, 'Look, we have left everything and followed you. What then will we have?' Jesus said to them, 'Truly I tell you, at the renewal of all things, when the Son of Man is seated on the throne of his glory, you who have followed me will also sit on twelve thrones, judging the twelve tribes of Israel. And everyone who has left houses or brothers or sisters or father or mother or children or fields, for my name's sake, will receive a hundredfold, and will inherit eternal life. But many who are first will be last, and the last will be first.

Creed

We stand to sing the Profession of Faith

**We believe in one God the Father almighty, maker of heaven and earth,
and of all things visible and invisible;**

**And in one Lord Jesus Christ, the only begotten Son of God,
begotten of his Father before all worlds,**

**God of God, Light of Light, very God of very God,
begotten not made, being of one substance with the Father,
by whom all things were made,
who for us men and for our salvation came down from heaven,
and was incarnate by the Holy Ghost of the Virgin Mary,
and was made man.
and was crucified also for us under Pontius Pilate.
He suffered and was buried,
and the third day he rose again according to the Scriptures,
and ascended into heaven, and sitteth on the right hand of the Father.
And he shall come again with glory to judge both the quick and the dead,
whose kingdom shall have no end.**

**And I believe in the Holy Ghost, the Lord, the giver of life,
who proceedeth from the Father [and the Son],

The Liturgy of the Sacrament

Peace

The peace of the Lord be always with you
and also with you.

We exchange a sign of Peace before the hymn at the Preparation of the Table is sung (REH 206):

**When God in mercy claimed him, That persecutor, Saul,
He called him, and renamed him His own apostle Paul.
Give thanks for his salvation When light from heaven showed
A new redeemed creation On that Damascus road.**

**A Jew by long tradition, There then to Paul was shown
A world-embracing mission To make the gospel known;
That all might hear the story Of why Messiah died,
The life-imparting glory Of Christ the crucified.**

**Paul lived to serve his Master And see his work fulfilled,
As shepherd, preacher, pastor, The church of Christ to build.
Of all that God imparted One aim alone sufficed
With Paul, the single-hearted: 'for me to live is Christ.'**
